The Board of County Commissioners of Sheridan County, Wyoming met in Special Session at the time and place above-mentioned. Members present were Chairman Terry Cram, Commissioner Steve Maier and Commissioner Robert L. Rolston. Chairman Cram called the meeting to order and then led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Cram stated that the purpose of the meeting was to consider adopting affordable housing rules to utilize SLIB funding and to proclaim May 25, 2007 as National Take 25 Day. No other business would be considered.

Chairman Cram said that the County shall receive \$2,000,000 in industry match funding through the State Loan and Investment Board. Four contractors have requested assistance with infrastructure for new subdivisions, which include variable numbers of affordable housing units, totaling 185 between them. Under the industry match program, the contractors will receive assistance formulated on the number of housing units provided. To ensure accountability for this funding, each contractor must execute an agreement with the County and abide by the rules setting out the grant process and requirements. Affordable housing units must be sold to individuals at 100% or below the median income range by family size. Business Manager Renee Obermueller said Marie Lowe of SHAC would administer the program. The Board adopted the Affordable Housing Rules and authorized the rules to be incorporated into the agreements executed by developers requesting infrastructure assistance.

Upon the recommendation of County Attorney Matt Redle, the Board proclaimed May 25, 2007 as Take 25 Day in Sheridan County.

Proclamation

National Center for Missing & Exploited Children  
National Missing Children's Day

Whereas, according to the U.S. Department of Justice, in one year there was an estimated nearly 800,000 children missing; and

Whereas, on average, there are an estimated average of 2,185 children reported missing to law-enforcement agencies daily; and

Whereas, 58,200 of these children are victims of non-family abductions and more than 200,000 are the victims of family abductions; and

Whereas, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children exists as a resource to help prevent child abduction and sexual exploitation; help find missing children; and assist victims of child abduction and sexual exploitation, their families, and the professionals who serve them, and although the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children assists law enforcement in the recovery of 96% of domestically missing children, too many children remain among the missing.

Whereas, this special day is a time to remember those children who are missing and give hope to their families.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that, in partnership with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children and its collaborative organizations, Sheridan County proclaims May 25 "National Missing Children's Day."

Therefore, be it further resolved that Sheridan County urges the participation of local government, law enforcement, schools, community-based organizations, and families in the protection and education of all individuals about the threat of child abduction and sexual exploitation, appropriate protective measures, and ways to respond and seek help from law enforcement and social services.

Therefore, be it further resolved that Sheridan County informs parents, guardians and others that on the last day of school, the Sheridan Police Department, Sheridan County Sheriff's Office, the Sheridan office of the Department of Family Services and the Sheridan County and Prosecuting Attorney's office, will provide children throughout the county with information designed to assist parents and other responsible adults in doing safety planning with their children.

Therefore, be it further resolved that Sheridan County encourages all individuals to Take 25 minutes to teach a child important, possibly life-saving, safety tips.

Therefore, be it proclaimed by the Board of County Commissioners of Sheridan County that May 25, 2007, is set aside as National Missing Children's Day as part of Sheridan County's continuing efforts to prevent the abduction and sexual exploitation of children.
